Homeowners are creating comfortable and inviting living spaces outside By Christopher Yasiejko

Look out the sliding glass doors in Tom Dever's house and you'll see what appears to be a living room with one wall of fieldstone and a pergola with white framework as a ceiling.



There are suggestions of other walls – 18-inch-high stone borders capped with cast concrete in a terra-cotta shade that picks up a color in the stones – but Dever's intention for the construction project was to replace the drab deck with a functional, attractive outdoor living space.

"It was important to make it something that would contribute to the feel of the house as a whole," says Dever, who lives with his wife and three children in Thornton, PA.

Whether with a few well-placed chairs and a coffee table or with an elaborate backyard fireplace – the focal point of Dever's setup – outdoor living spaces are becoming more an extension of the home.

As president of Dever Architects, Dever is working on The Promenade at Middletown, a large, mixed-use property. In 1981, he designed and built his home. He expanded it as he expanded his family, but their deck – "a featureless plane of pressure-treated wood" that he says was "typical of the early '80s" – would bake in the sun and didn't get much use.

They planted a couple of trees, which over time have provided some shade. With the help of a landscape architect, Dever designed and built the space that benefits from that shade.

The room-like area accounts for about a quarter of the deck's 1,100 square feet. The stainless steel exterior gas fireplace is its jewel. A flick of the remote control sets flames jumping.

Dever's sister-in-law, an interior designer, suggested the Summer Classics furniture – a double reclining chaise, a sofa, a chair and ottoman and a coffee table.

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
